President's Message

Boy, isn't it hard to believe it's been over a year since **Hurricane Ike** played havoc with **Pearland** and the rest of the **Gulf Coast**. When you drive around **Pearland**, you will still see a roof with a blue tarp on it now and then. Surely do hope we can get through this season without another hurricane of any kind much less one as powerful as "**Ike**" blowing through **Pearland**. Hurricanes have affected the history of **Pearland** starting with the terrible one of 1900. At that time **Pearland** was a 6 year old fast growing community. According to **Mrs. Emma Coppinger (Vic Coppinger's mother)** in a brief history of **Pearland** which she wrote in 1941, at the time of the 1900 storm **Pearland** had over 100 students in school. After the storm, the railroad gave free passage to those who wanted to return to their homes in the mid-west; and the number of students left in school was less than 40! Then in 1915 another terrible hurricane blew through and destroyed the brick school the citizens of **Pearland** had built in 1912. For the next 22 years **Pearland** students were bused to **Webster** to attend high school. It doesn't seem possible another year as gone by since "**Ike**" did his thing.

Speaking of time zipping by always make you think about our need to attract a younger group into our **Historical Society**. Every year at our **Reunion Luncheon** when we light the candles in memory of our members and old time **Pearlanders** who have passed away I think we are all thinking "who's going to take their place?" **Society Member Judy Meade**, who lives in **Bandera, Texas**, came up with a great suggestion which might encourage new and younger members. **Judy's** suggestion is that we

purchase "gift" certificates for one year memberships in the **Historical Society** and give them to relatives and friends and particularly to younger people. You can read more about this further in the **Newsletter**.

What's Happening


At the July meeting, **Dwight Bittick** presented guidelines his committee is proposing for the selection of homes which will be considered for old **Pearland** historical home plaques. It was suggested that the guidelines be e-mailed to members for their consideration and thoughts. All of the replies have been very positive and we will be moving forward with a program to award plaques to homes which qualify as a "**Pearland Historical Society Old Pearland Historical Home.**"

Society Treasurer Peggy Farthing Long reported as of June 30th the **Society** had a balance of \$40,599.11. We all owe **Peggy** a big "thank you" for the hard work she does as our **Treasurer**. It is a lot of work and **Peggy** does an outstanding job.

We now have an application form from the **Texas State Historical Commission** to apply for a **Texas State Historical Marker** for "**Robert L. and Julia Martin Hunter Park**" on **Orange Street**. The "**Park**" is on property which originally was part of the **Robert L. and Julia Martin Hunter** homestead. **Julia Martin** came to **Pearland** in 1894. **Robert L. Hunter's** father, **Dr. Johnson Calhoun Hunter**, came to **Texas** as one of **Moses Austin's** original 300. **Robert L. Hunter** came to **Pearland** in 1900. So the property where the **Park** now is has a rich **Texas and Pearland** history; and it becomes our task to document the history and get the marker. Procedure is we will have to send the application through the **Brazoria County Historical Commission** who will have to approve the application and forward it on to the **State**. **Hurricane Ike's** impact and unexpected budget expenses have set the **Parks and Recreation Department's** time schedule back for the **Park**. Also the **City** will be putting drainage pipes from **Plum Street** down **Park Street** and through **Hunter Park** to **Town Ditch** before the **Park** can be finished.

The "**Old Townsite Neighbors**" continue to meet the first Thursday of each month; however there will be no meetings for the next two months. **Kyler Cole** and wife **Shannon** are expecting their first born child (a boy) the last of **September**. Further in the **Newsletter** are pictures of the homes with the "**Yard of the Month**" for the last two months.

At the last "**Old Townsite**" meeting, **Kyler Cole** showed those in attendance a drawing of an "**Old Townsite**" entrance monument which will be built at the intersection of **Highway 518 west and Walnut Street**. Although technically the "**Old Townsite**" does not start until one reaches **Austin Street**, the little triangle at **518 and Walnut** is an ideal spot for this monument which will let motorists know they are about to enter "**Old Pearland.**" Our **Historical Society** is very appreciative of the work **Kyler** and the **Old Townsite** group are doing to improve old **Pearland**.

Old Street Signs for Sale

Want to have a bit of **Pearland** history for a souvenir?

Most of our readers probably recall the new “**Old Townsite**” street signs which the **Pearland Old Townsite Business Coalition** placed in the **Old Townsite**. At our **Reunion Luncheon** on **Oct. 24th**, you will have an opportunity to purchase the old street signs which were taken down and replaced with the historic district signs.

The **Old Townsite Business Coalition** will have a table set up in the foyer of the **Community Center** in front of the **Parks and Recreation** office and will be selling the signs on a first come, first served basis. The **Coalition** will also be advertising the sale in both **Pearland Newspapers**. The regular sized street signs (12” x 30”) will sell for \$100 each. The larger signs for **Broadway, Main, Galveston, FM518, and SH 35** (ranging in size from 12” x 42” to 18” x 96”) will sell for \$150 each. The money from the sales will go toward the purchase of the historical banners for the lamp posts on **Grand Blvd.** Sales will begin at 11 A.M. and conclude at 2:00 P.M. Sales are to be cash (correct change only) or by checks made out to the “**Old Townsite Business Coalition**”.

Remembering When Pearland Town Team topped the New York Yankees

Much has been said and written about the Sunday afternoon baseball games at **Zychlinski Park** and what a prominent place “town team baseball” holds in the history of **Pearland**. When the discussion of baseball comes up, many old time **Pearland** family names are quickly remembered - - **Yost, Jamison, Maness, Massey, Lane**, and many others. Many stories have been told about the town teams. Some of you may remember the story about the disappearing

tree from center field or “**Fuzzy**” **Hufft**’s mighty blast; but **Luther Cunningham** recently recalled a story often told by **Lloyd Yost** wherein **Lloyd** presented the case that the **Pearland Town Team** one year was better than the world champion **New York Yankees**. **Luther** recalled the story went something like this. **Pearland** played and beat the prison team from **Sugar Land**. The prison team from **Sugar Land** played and beat the prison team from **Huntsville**. The **Huntsville** prison team played and beat the **Huntsville Merchants**. The **Huntsville Merchants** played and beat the old **Texas League Houston Buffs**. The **Houston Buffs** played and beat the **New York Yankees** in a spring training exhibition game. The **Yankees** went on to win the **World Series**. Don't Forget the Reunion Luncheon


